Monochromatic: How can we find our own style?

In this final drawing unit, children will build on the knowledge and skills they have studied through KS2 and KS1. Children will learn specific skills and techniques to confidently use line, shape and value to create their own artwork. They will use pencils and ballpoint pens to explore shading, blending and markmaking and will have developed a proficiency at controlling and selecting the appropriate tools. They will be able to articulate their observations. They will evaluate their own work as well as that of their peers.



Maya



Civilisation



History:

What similarities and differences are there between the Maya civilisation and England from the 8th to the 10th century?

Exploring who Maya people were and where in the world they lived and the reasons why they were so successful. Then discovering how we know about the Maya people, their beliefs and the hierarchy system that we in place in society and the important inventions that they made, especially in farming. The unit finishes with a comparison between the Ancient Maya Civilisation and Anglo-Saxon Britain, with a focus on the similarities and differences between the Maya City States and the Anglo-Saxon Kingdoms; drawing on the archaeological evidence available to us.



Christianity: What does it mean if Christians believe God is Holy and loving

Within this unit, pupils will learn about what Christians believe God is like, exploring key texts from the Bible, using ways of knowing that theologians use.

Islam: What does it mean to be Muslim in Britain today?

In this unit, the children will extend their knowledge of Muslim beliefs about God, the Prophet and the Holy Qur'an.

Practice weekly spellings.



Pupils will continue to develop a chronologically secure knowledge and understanding of British, local and world history, establishing clear narratives within and across the periods they study. They will make connections, contrasts and trends over time and develop the appropriate use of historical terms.
